
KEITH RICARDO BURRUS



Jim's future plans are to attend Rutgers University in pursuit of a psychology major.










MICHAEL JOHN READ

Dan plans to enter Northern Virginia Community College studying special education or business administration.





Steve will continue his studies for the priesthood at the Chicago House of Studies next year where he will seek a Bachelor's Degree in English.




