On April 10th, forty-six seminarians from IHM participated in a special Vocation program sponsored by the Pittsfield Serra Club. The program was conducted in St. Mark's Parish Center in Pittsfield.

The evening was spent in entertaining and conversing with the parish CCD boys and girls. The purpose was to better acquaint the local youth with the purpose and function of the seminary.

The evening opened with a speech by Rich Urda. The entertainment which followed was provided by John Holland and his talking dummy, and various singing groups, including the IHM Glee Club under the direction of Father Krah.

Informal discussions followed the entertainment portion of the evening. These gave the local students a chance to ask questions they might have about seminary life.

A traveller arrives, and through his questions the actual murderer is revealed and all present realize that the man they had hanged that morning was actually innocent. Terry Langley, Yvon Sheehy, Sam Roma, Jay Thomas, Bob Trahan, and Bruce Fischer did an excellent job in portraying the parts. Father Leo Krah and Yvon Sheehy were the directors of the play.

Next the comedy "Action" tickled the audience's funny bone with side-splitting antics as Max, an old Jewish silk merchant, tries to prove to his son, an Air Force Pilot, that there is even "action" in the silk business. Jim Walters, Rich Urda, Tom McCormick, Rich Harcar, Louis Sanabria, Hugh Winarski, Ron Pherdihirt, Tom

Irwin, Sam Roma, and Ray Reska did a fine job in this play. The combined efforts of Frater Wayne Richards and Dick Urda did much to make this play a success.

The roles in this play were well performed by George Lopuch, Greg Blanchfield, Ed Lach, Marty Torrey, and Louis Sanabria. Again Father Krah, along with Ed Lach, directed the play.

I.H.M. DEBATERS PLACE FIFTH IN STATE TOURNEY

Bellefontaine's debaters closed their file boxes on a season which Father Corcoran, faculty moderator, termed "the finest ever." The year's work was capped by a fifth place finish in the semi-final round of the Massachusetts State debate tournament.

The varsity team of Ray Reska, Rich Urda, John Holland, and John Trahan had qualified for the semi-finals by finishing among the top five teams in the western Massachusetts regionals held March 11 at Westfield State College. They had combined for a 4-2 record.

A total of 12 schools throughout the state had qualified for the semi-finals held March 18 at Shrewsbury High School. Here Immaculate Heart scored a 5-3 record. This tied them with the third and fourth place teams who had identical records but when the tie was broken on the basis of speaker rank the IHM team fell one and a half points behind 4th place, St. Peter's of Worcester. This cost them their chance to compete in the finals which narrow the field down to the top four teams.

WIN SECOND AND THIRD PLACE TROPHIES IN COUNTY LEAGUE

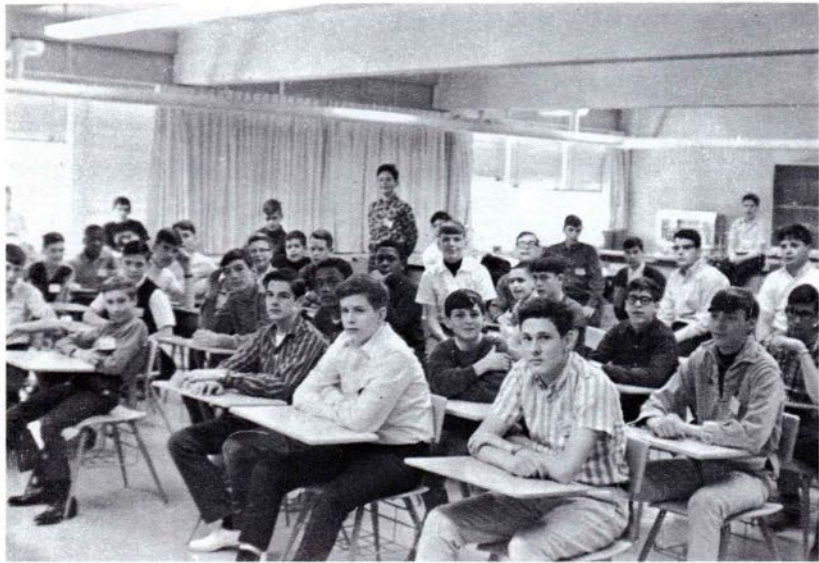
A week before the state contest, the Berkshire County Debating League ended its season. Here the varsity captured the second place trophy while the novices won the third place trophy in their division.

Friday afternoon, April 28th, thirty-five eighth graders came to Bellefontaine to spend the weekend. These are the men who are interested in coming to IHM next year.

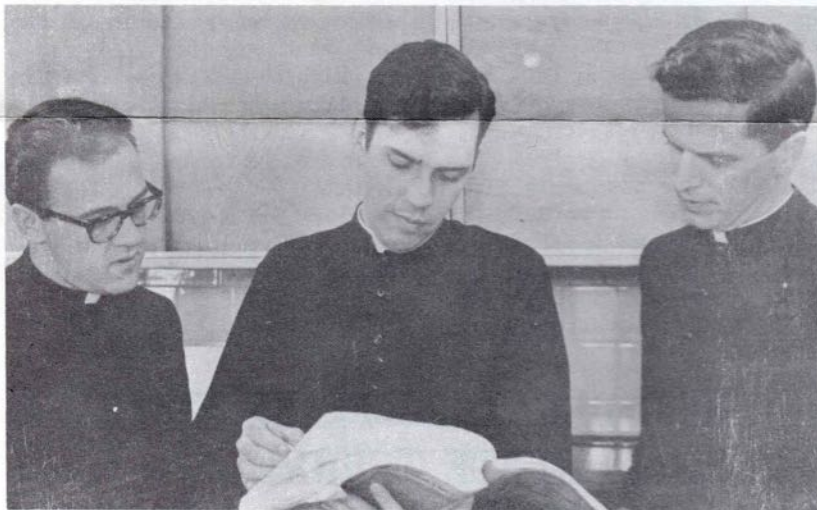
The visitors traveled from all parts of the northeastern states by means of a chartered bus.

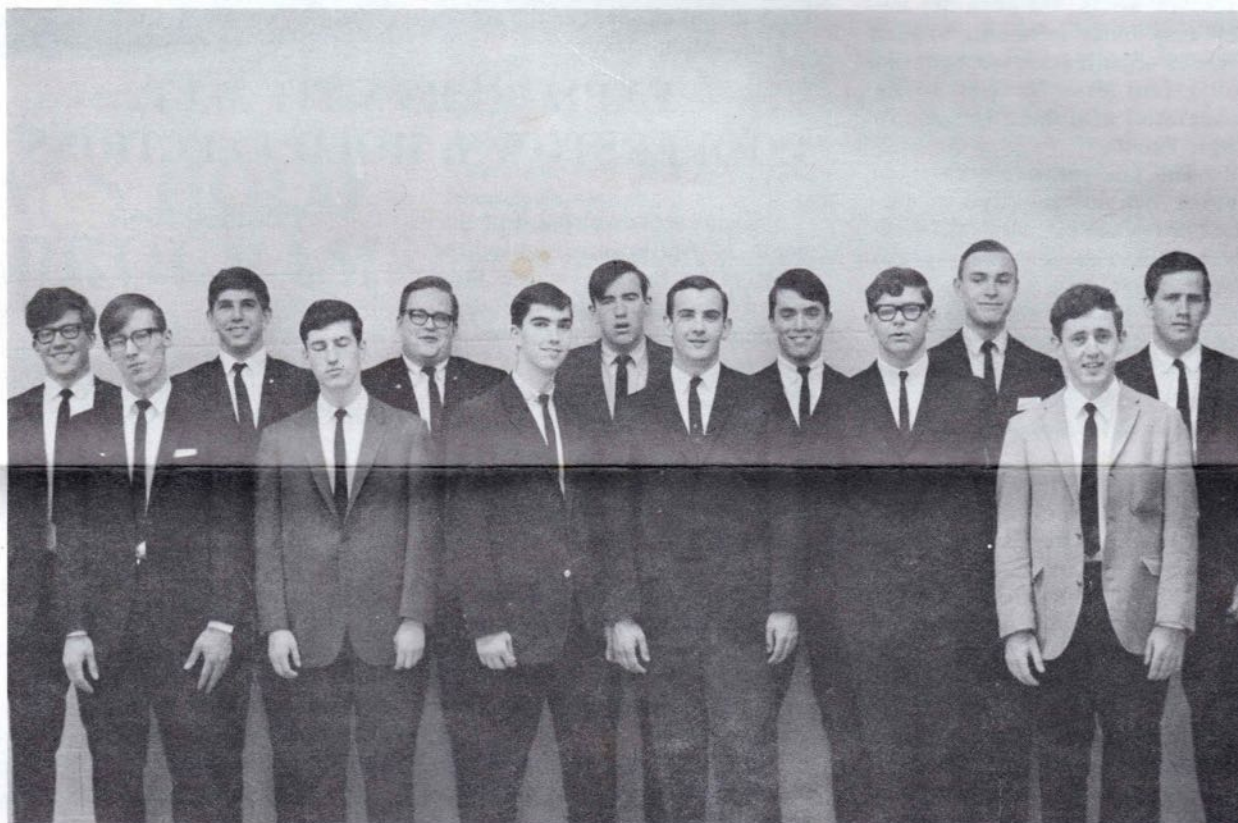
Kevin has won two varsity letters in basketball and football. He has also received a trophy for sportsmanship for the past year's basketball season.

Bellefontaine had its annual sports night here Thursday, April 20th. Letters and trophies were awarded and Mr. Roger O'Gara, sports editor for the Berkshire Eagle addressed the student body on the aspect of sportsmanship in competitive games.

Letters in Basketball were awarded to those who, in the opinion of their fellow players, were the best in their division of ability and sportsmanship. These letters were awarded by Fathers Corcoran and MacDonald and Fraters Marks and Richards.

Next, trophies were given out for Most Valuable Player and Best in Sportsmanship in each division of football and hockey. These were presented by Mr. Roger O'Gara.

Traveling trophies were also given out. These went to Larry Kish, Free Throw Champion who sunk 19 out of 25 shots; and Hugh Winarski; Ping Pong Champion who beat out the best in the school in elimination rounds.

Mr. O'Gara gave the seminarians a talk on the true meaning of Sportsmanship, which was peppered with amusing stories and anecdotes. Mr. O'Gara was one of the originators of the Morning-side All Stars, a Junior Baseball team of the late 20's. He played second base for his high school, as well as for the American Le-

gion and Bucknell University. On the night of the speech, he received formal notification that he was chosen president of the National Association of Baseball Writers. This group has 400 members covering teams in the 21 Minor leagues. It is the Minor league counterpart of the Baseball Writers of America.
